### DAY 1 – Saturday

Miami, FL, US – Departure to Cuba



This morning please plan to meet by 5:00 am in the Xael Charters counter. Check in will be in concourse G adjacent to the Dunkin Donuts. Lines queue up according to the flight, not just those flying with the charter company, so make sure you get in the correct line.

**Breakfast:** There are many dining options at the airport after you check in, but before you clear security and head to your gate.

**Departure:** 9:00 am

Departure is scheduled this morning on XAEL Charter service (operated by World Atlantic) at approximately 9:00 am (check-in begins as early as 5:00).

### WELCOME TO CUBA!!

Upon arrival at the Havana International Airport, you will need to make your way through passport control where they will take your photo (be prepared to remove any hats,

scarves or glasses) and check your paperwork for entry into Cuba. Make your way to baggage claim and from there exit through customs to where your national guide will be waiting for the delegation.

**Lunch:** Enjoy some sites of the city in a panoramic bus tour of Havana en-route to lunch.

**Hotel Check-In:** Early this afternoon the delegation will transfer to your hotel, check in and settle into your rooms before meeting in the hotel conference center for your welcome briefing.

**Dinner:** Enjoy a welcome dinner.

### DAY 2 – Sunday

Havana, Cuba



**Breakfast:** Provided daily during your stay.

**Tour:** Walking tour of Old Havana, a two-square-kilometer neighborhood that is the core of the Spanish port city built during colonial times. See the restoration of the colonial core of the city, Havana cultural and business life including visits with entrepreneurs. The area, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, is undergoing a massive restoration funded by tourism, preserving colonial architecture and renovating housing and services for neighborhood residents. Visit restaurants and eateries, hotels and inns, and artists' studios in Old Havana. Have discussions with Cubans involved in these ventures and see what residents experience when centuries-old buildings are renovated.

**Visit:** Visit Centro Cultural Antiguos Almacenes market to visit and talk with private sector owners of more than 300 different booths selling art, handicrafts, clothing, and a variety of Cuban products.

**Lunch:** Lunch will be provided at a local restaurant.

**Learn:** Afternoon “Basic Spanish Lesson” conducted by a local teacher.

**Dinner:** Provided at a local restaurant.

### DAY 3 – Monday

Havana, Cuba



### Breakfast

**Learn:** This morning the delegation will have a welcome orientation to Cuba on behalf of the staff at the Cuban Institute of Friendship with People in conjunction with our local team at the Casa de la Amistad. This mandatory meeting focuses on Cuban/U.S. relations, and is a required component of all US visits to Cuba. (Duration 45 minutes)

**Visit:** Morning visit to the Vivero Alamar is a farm located in Alamar, a large barrio (public housing project) just outside of Havana, Cuba. Founded in 1997 by Miguel Salcines, a former agronomist for the Ministry of Agriculture, along with three others, the farm developed as a way to feed the surrounding neighborhood. Vivero Alamar is just one of many organopónicos (organic urban farms) that have emerged since the early 1990s. It has become one of the most well-known such farms, both in Cuba and around the world. Originally an 800 square meter (8611 square foot) vegetable garden, the farm has grown to over 25 acres and includes animals, fruits, herbs and value-added products like vinegars and spices. It also employs over 160 people.

Vivero Alamar sells its produce to nearly 50,000 people every year. Prior to its existence, fresh produce was much more difficult to obtain. Today, the farm plants three million seedlings and harvests 300 tons of vegetables annually.

After the collapse of the Soviet Union, Cuba's primary economic partner, the country struggled to reinvent itself. Without an outside source to provide farm equipment, tools,

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fertilizer or chemicals, the country's farms became organic by default. Cubans embraced this new way of farming. Today, organopónicos like Vivero Alamar are completely sustainable and organic. They are constantly innovating and finding ways to nurture and harvest crops to provide nutritious, fresh food to their communities.

**Lunch:** Provided at local restaurant.

**Visit:** The museum's Cuban history exhibits are largely devoted to the period of the revolutionary war of the 1950s and to the country's post-1959 history. Portions of the museum are also devoted to pre-revolutionary Cuba, including its War of Independence waged against Spain.

Behind the building lies the Granma Memorial, a large glass enclosure which houses the Granma, the yacht which took Fidel Castro and his revolutionaries from Mexico to Cuba for the revolution. Around the Granma an SA-2 Guideline surface-to-air missile of the type that shot down a U.S. Lockheed U-2 spyplane during the Cuban Missile Crisis, and the engine of the U-2 airplane is displayed. There are also various vehicles and tanks used in the revolution displayed. Near the museum is located an SU-100, a Soviet tank destroyer.

**Dinner:** Provided at a local restaurant.

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#### DAY 4 – Tuesday

Havana, Cuba



#### Breakfast

**Visit:** This morning visit the Museo de Bellas Artes (Fine Arts Museum). The Fine Arts Museum is dedicated exclusively to Cuban art collections beginning in the mid-16th century. Spanning the 17th and 19th centuries, it has galleries devoted to landscape, religious subjects and the Costumbrismo narrative scenes of Cuban life. Other galleries are devoted to more current work, and are recognized for the extensive collection of Hyperrealism and the latest generation of Cuban

**Lunch:** Provided at a local restaurant.

**Visit:** This afternoon visit the Hemingway Museum located in the Finca Vigia, former residence of the American writer located in the San Francisco de Paula neighborhood on the outskirts of the city. We will tour along the beltway of the city reaching Cojimar, a fisherman's village where Hemingway docked his fishing boat "El Pilar", a source of inspiration for this famous novel "The Old Man and the Sea".

#### Dinner

**Celebrate:** After dinner depart for the Cannon Blast Ceremony held each night at the La Cabaña fortress. The Fortaleza de San Carlos de la Cabaña was built around 1774 by the Spaniards to control the access of the Havana Port. Soldiers dressed in 18th century uniforms fire a cannon over Havana bay at precisely 9 p.m. o'clock. It is a historical reconstruction dating back to the colonial era. Back then, the cannon fire announced the official end of the day and the time to close the city gates for the night.

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#### DAY 5 – Wednesday

Havana, Cuba - Giron (2.5 hours)



#### Breakfast

**Road Trip:** Morning departure for Playa Larga – Giron. This excursion combines past and present. At the Bay of Pigs, a museum displays mementos of the unsuccessful mercenary invasion there. Guama resort houses a reconstructed Taino Indian Village in the middle of Treasure Lake.

**Visit:** Visit Korimacao Community Project for underprivileged youth in Palpite. Discussion on music education and health with teachers and students as well as meeting the creator of the project

**Lunch:** Provided at a local restaurant in Giron.

Overnight in Giron

**Dinner:** Provided at a local restaurant.

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#### DAY 6 – Thursday

Giron - Santa Clara (2 hours)



#### Breakfast

After breakfast, prepare luggage for check out.

**Road Trip:** Board your motor for your trip to Santa Clara.

**Lunch:** Provided at a local restaurant.

**Tour:** Your afternoon city tour starts at Parque Leoncio Vidal, the Museo de Artes Decorativas occupies a magnificent colonial house built around 1740. Transformed over the centuries, it was restored in 1820 and again in 1980. The memory of Che Guevara permeates the town of Santa Clara. Walk around the Plaza de la Revolución dedicated to the famous Argentine guerrilla who fought fiercely alongside Fidel

Castro to overthrow Batista. A special visit to the "Che Guevara Memorial" has been arranged.

**Dinner:** Provided at a local restaurant.

**Celebrate:** This evening enjoy a neighborhood street party with all the residents of the block participating. It's a great opportunity to interact with the locals.

**Donations:** The delegation should collaborate to bring some sodas, chips, crackers, sodas to contribute to the party. These can be purchased at the hotel or any local store. Also some gifts for children will be very much appreciated however we don't have quantities, ages or genders to share. We recommend small items that are easy to carry. Appropriate items could be school or art supplies, books and notebook paper/journals, stickers, children or teen magazines, matchbox cars, dolls, card or board games, etc.

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#### DAY 7 – Friday

Santa Clara - Remedios (45 minutes)



#### Breakfast

**Road Trip:** Morning departure for the city of Remedios. Tour the city with one of the city's historians who will discuss the town's history. Visit the San Juan Bautista Church and the Alejandro Garcia Caturla Museum which is located in the home of this famous Cuban composer.

**Tour:** Remedios, a charming town boasting colonial architecture and cobble stoned streets. Established in 1514 and now with a population of 18,000 inhabitants, Remedios is considered a national monument and will be celebrating its 500 year anniversary in 2014.

Remedios is also known for its Parrandas Festival, an annual carnival-like celebration that takes place at the end of December. You'll see some of the floats and costumes in various stages of creation and construction and speak with the volunteers and festival officials.

**Lunch:** Provided at a local restaurant.

**Road Trip:** Continue on a short drive to the nearby fishing community of Caibarien.

**Visit:** Visit the art project "Por La Costa" Community Art Project and meet the family that runs the project, talk about art, paper making and see the workshops they conduct for the local children.

**Dinner:** Provided at a local restaurant.

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## DAY 8 – Saturday

Santa Clara - Matanzas (2.5 hours)



### Breakfast

**Road Trip:** Morning departure for Matanzas the capital of the Cuban province of Matanzas. Known for its poets, culture, and Afro-Cuban folklore, it is located on the northern shore of the island of Cuba, on the Bay of Matanzas (Spanish Bahía de Matanzas), 90 kilometres (56 mi) east of the capital Havana and 32 kilometres (20 mi) west of the resort town of Varadero.

**Tour:** Matanzas is called the City of Bridges, for the seventeen bridges that cross the three rivers that traverse the city (Rio Yumuri, San Juan, and Canimar). For this reason it was referred to as the “Venice of Cuba.” It was also called “La Atenas de Cuba” (“The Athens of Cuba”) for its poets. Matanzas is known as the birthplace of the music and dance traditions danzón and rumba.

On this excursion you will be taken to explore Matanzas city and enjoy all it has to offer, from its historical museums to its diversity and richness in Afro-Cuban folklore. We invite you to join us in a stroll down its quaint streets with its main squares, local food market and the fantastically well-preserved pharmaceutical museum.

**Lunch:** Provided at a local restaurant.

**Visit:** And a visit to Matanzas wouldn't be complete without an excursion to the Bellamar Caves and this is exactly where we'll be taking you as part of your day tour. The Bellamar Caves are considered one of the of the Caribbean's largest and most beautiful underground formations. Two kilometers of underground passages are covered in peculiar stalagmites, stalactites and calcite crystals all of which you will be able to witness as we take you down to the deepest caves in Cuba with some unexplored chambers still being developed.

**Dinner:** Provided at a local restaurant.

## DAY 9 – Sunday

Matanzas - Caimito (1.5 hours)



### Breakfast

**Road Trip:** After breakfast departure Caimito, upon arrival transfer to the Antonio Mella International Camp. Attend an ICAP presentation which will provide the delegation with a full explanation of the Camp's history and importance.

**Lunch:** Provided at the camp and you will be able to exchange with the local farmers.

**Volunteer:** You will join the local workers on an agricultural volunteer work session which will provide you with a wider understanding of the Cuban reality.

**Dinner:** Provided at the camp.

## DAY 10 – Monday

Caimito



### Breakfast

**Volunteer:** Full day at the camp engaging in diverse volunteer work sessions with local workers and students.

**Lunch:** Provided at the camp.

**Dinner:** Provided at a local restaurant.

## DAY 11 – Tuesday

Caimito - Viñales (1.5 hours)



### Breakfast

**Tour:** This morning you find yourself in a unique contrast of flat top hillocks, rocky heights and magnificent forests. You are in the Viñales Valley for a full day. The fertile tobacco fields are the most important part of the region. The best tobacco in the world comes from Vuelta Abajo, west of the provincial capital. Visit a tobacco farm and engage in conversation with the factory workers. Continue to the city of Viñales City and exchange with the local residents that are now involved in the new economic changes including the opening of private restaurants and rental properties. Perfect afternoon to walk or horseback riding through the tobacco fields and meet and talk with the farmers in the valley.

**Lunch:** Provided at a local restaurant.

Return to the Antonio Mella International Camp for overnight.

**Dinner:** Provided at a local restaurant.

## DAY 12 – Wednesday

Caimito - Havana



### Breakfast

**Road Trip:** Early morning departure for Havana.

**Visit:** Visit the Literacy Museum, tracing Cuba's achievements in the Great Literacy Campaign. The Cuban Literacy Campaign was a year-long effort to abolish illiteracy in Cuba after the triumph of the Cuban Revolution. This campaign became the world's most ambitious literacy campaign.

Cuba has one of the highest ranking educational systems in Latin America. In spite of limited resources, a lack of instructional materials and technology, Cuba has established a literacy rate of 97%. What is the secret behind their success?

**Lunch:** Provided at a local restaurant.

**Visit:** Spend your afternoon at the Muraleando - Community Arts in a Havana Barrio.

When local artists Manuel (Manolo) Díaz Baldrich and Ernesto Quirch Paz began teaching art workshops in the neighborhood school in 2001, they had no thoughts of starting a community development project. But their classes conflicted with the schedule of the state-run computer program so they moved the workshops into the streets, and there the seeds of Muraleando (literally “muraling” or mural-making) were sown.

The murals that started springing up all along Mercedes Muñoz and around the corner on Aguilera were a natural outgrowth of the art classes. The murals depict fanciful celebrations of Cuban life. In a country where nothing is disposable and everything is useful, broken typewriters, old telephones, tire rims, wrought-iron chair parts - all were fair game to weld and paint and turn into sculpture.

**Dinner:** Provided at a local restaurant.

## DAY 13 – Thursday

Havana



### Breakfast

**Learn:** This morning the delegation will meet with the professors and students of La Escuela Taller Gaspar Melchor de Jovellanos (Gaspar Melchor de Jovellanos Workshop School). This unique institution was established in 1992 in a heroic effort to train youth in the arts, crafts and theoretical knowledge to rehabilitate and preserve their architectural heritage. The school teaches young people archeological and restoration skills necessary to sustain the physical heritage and cultural patrimony of Old Havana. The Cuban capital harbors the largest collection of colonial-era Spanish architecture in our hemisphere.

**Lunch:** Provided at a local restaurant.

**Visit:** Afternoon visit to La Casa del Niño y la Niña Community Project.

This community projects helps school-age children with their schooling as well as art and cultural studies. This is a great opportunity to meet the kids and hear them speak about their lives and this project. They are all intelligent, well-spoken and full of ideas and hope. The motto of the project is: Listening to young voices and taking them into account for a better world. You will experience that children, in Cuban society, are highly valued. They are all aware of, and even recite the basic principles of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child, Article 31. They even have a song about it! The article states the rights of children, here are a few: the right to a name and nationality, the right to not be discriminated against for any reason, the right to have fun and play, the right to their own opinion, the right to special care if they are physically or mentally disabled, the right to adequate food, housing and medical care, the right to develop their full potential.

**Dinner:** Provided at a local restaurant.

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## DAY 14 – Friday

Havana



### Breakfast

**Visit:** This morning depart for a visit to the city of Regla. Visit the church of Nuestra Señora de Regla, one of Cuba’s most frequented pilgrimage churches. The most impressive is the statute of the Virgin of Regla who is black and cradles a white infant in her arms. She is the patron and protector of sailors. She is considered the equivalent of Yemaya, the goddess of the sea in the Yoruba religion. Visit the Municipal Museum of Regla. There will be a ritual dance of Santería, the religion brought to Cuba by African slaves.

**Lunch:** Provided at a local restaurant.

**Visit:** This afternoon the delegation will also visit Convento de Nuestra Señora de Belén. A special visit has been arranged to the restored 18th century convent in the middle of Old Havana. They have a health clinic and pharmacy, physical therapy for the elderly, services for disabled youth, an eye care center and glasses for all ages, meals for those in need, support for single mothers, occupational

training and they are working on some limited housing as well (under construction). Mass and other religious services are held at the convent and there is a full schedule of crafts, musicals and other activities for the seniors. During hurricane season the center also functions as an emergency shelter. They have on onsite (albeit small) daycare as well for the workers and a select few local families with the greatest need.

**Dinner:** Farewell dinner will be provided at a local restaurant.

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## DAY 15 – Saturday


Havana



### Breakfast

Today you bid farewell to Cuba, “The Pearl of the Antilles.”

**Departure:** Transfer to the airport for departure. Our guide and local airport representative will be available to help you with the check-in procedures.



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# INFORMATION

## Reservations:

Deposit of \$500 per person is required to confirm your space in this tour. Final payment is due by April 1, 2016. Check payment should be made to the order of Interplanner. Credit card payments are not accepted.

The package has been based on a minimum participation of 25 full paying participants. Should the number of participants, travel dates, tariffs and/or exchange rates change, the right is reserved to re-cost this program in light of such changes and to make the necessary alterations at the time of settlement of account. Full payment should be received by INTERPLANNER no later than April 1, 2016.

## Travel Restrictions:

Travel to Cuba is severely restricted under the Cuban Assets Control Regulations. Under these regulations, spending money relating to Cuban travel is prohibited unless the traveler is licensed. There are some travel categories that are authorized under the OFAC general license.

Further, each traveler must complete and sign a Travel Affidavit before departure. Forms will be provided by Interplanner. Forms must be received by INTERPLANNER no later than April 1, 2016.

## Travel Provider:

The U.S. Treasury Department requires that travel arrangements can only be made with a licensed Travel Service Provider. Interplanner's license number is CU- 51857A

## Air Transportation:

Air transportation by Xael Charters. Airfare based on the group charter advanced purchased airfare. Round trip airfare from Miami to Cuba is \$469.00 – Cancellation penalties are: 7 to 3 days 50% of the amount paid, within 3 days prior to departure there will be no refund. All airfares are subject to change without prior notice. Final payment is due by April 1, 2016.

Baggage allowance is 44 pounds including carry-on. Excess baggage is charged at \$2.00 per pound. There is a charge of \$25.00 for first checked bag.

Your ticket purchase includes medical expenses for illness and accident up to \$25,000 USD and repatriation transport of deceased, injury and illness up to \$7,000 USD. See attached document from ESICUBA – ASISTUR.

A group consists of a minimum of 10, 16 or 21 ticketed adult passengers who must travel on the Xael Charters to the same destination on the same flights. In the event that your group does not meet this minimum, passengers will be considered as individual travelers and ticketed at the available published fare for which they qualify and which may be available.

## Air Transportation:

Round trip from Miami to Havana – \$469.00 U.S. departure tax is included.

\*Fare is based on current February 2016 fares and schedule based on 2016 flights schedules. Both are subject to change.

Charter carriers charge \$20 for each checked bag and have a weight allowance of 44 lbs. All weight in excess of 44 lbs. is subject to \$2.00 per pound.

## Important Notice:

There are no interline commercial agreements between U.S. domestic carriers and any charter. In the event of schedule changes or delays caused by the charter company, neither Interplanner nor the charter company will be responsible for any charges or penalties a participant may incur.

We recommend that participants refrain from making domestic reservations to the gateway city until we have received reservation confirmation from the charter company.

## Tour Price Includes:

Ground Transportation: All sightseeing and transfers as well as overland transportation will be by private motor coach with English speaking guides/interpreters.

Hotels Accommodations: All Accommodations will be provided in twin bedded rooms with private bath or shower.

Hotel categories are by official classification of the respective government. Single rooms are available at a supplement charge. Interplanner reserves the right to substitute any previously confirmed hotels in the event that the tour operator in the respective country encounters an oversold situation and to replace with others of similar or better quality. Additional costs incurred as a result of any such change in hotels shall be borne by the tour participant except in cases of change after travel has commenced. Any individual tour member who requests to share a twin-bedded room is subject to the payment of the single room supplement unless another tour participant is, or becomes, available to share. No refund is made for any unused portion of the member's original accommodations. Interplanner will try to assist the tour member in finding a suitable replacement hotel.

Meals: As specified in itinerary and listed in the tour features.

## Tips & Taxes:

Service charges imposed by hotels and taxes by local administration and government authorities are included in all services rendered. Tips to your local guides, drivers and restaurant staff are not included and are usually expected, subject to your own satisfaction with the services rendered. Departure tax is \$25.00 CUC and is included in the tour price.

## GENERAL INFORMATION

### Documentation Required:

A valid passport and individual Cuban visa is required for all U.S. and Canadian citizens. Vaccination or inoculations are not required, however, we urge you to consult your physician or local health department as requirements can change from time to time.

### Visas:

Visas will be obtained by Interplanner. Participants are required to provide a clear photocopy of their valid passport, participants born in Cuba regardless of their present nationality please contact us, since entry procedures differ. Interplanner cannot guarantee any visa if participants does not comply with the required deadlines. Visa fee is included in the tour price. Passport copies must be received by INTERPLANNER no later than April 1, 2016.

### Cancellations & Changes: (Land Package)

In the event of cancellation by the passenger, there is a \$50.00 per person administrative charge. The balance of payment will be refunded if written cancellation is received 30 days prior to departure. If cancellation is received 29 to 15 days before departure the charge is 25%. For cancellation less than 15 days prior to departure there will be no refunds. Changes once reservations have been confirmed on dates or names will be at \$25.00 USD fee per change. Trip cancellation insurance is recommended.

### Tour Membership:

The right is reserved to decline, to accept or to retain any person as a member of the tour.

### Final Itinerary & Travel Tips:

Will be sent to each participant after the tour operator has received final payment. The packet of information will give full details regarding mailing addresses, recommendations about baggage, suggestions for appropriate clothing, customs and currency regulations, departure instructions, and so on.

### Tariff & Exchange Fluctuation:

Prices are based upon tariffs and exchange levels in effect January 1, 2016 and are subject to change without notice.

### Transfers:

Provided on all arrivals and departures between hotels and airports for tour members and one average-sized piece of luggage per person. Please have in mind that due to limited space in motor coaches, only one suitcase per person is allowed

### Sightseeing:

By motor coach including the services of English-speaking guides and entrance fees to places visited.

### Tour Price:

All costs quoted are based on tariffs and currency exchange rates in effect at the beginning of each calendar year.

### Tour rate does not include:

Passport fees, laundry, valet wines and liquors, mineral waters, food, transportation not included in the itinerary, beverages not on the regular menu of the included meals, additional baggage in excess of allowance foreign airport taxes, and other expenses of purely personal nature.

### Responsibility:

International Planning Services, DBA/ INTERPLANNER and/or the travel agent act only as agents for the various companies, owners or contractors providing the means of transportation, accommodations or other services pertaining to the tour.

All exchange orders, vouchers, coupons and tickets are issued subject to the terms and conditions under such means of transportation, accommodations or other services are offered or provided. The issuance and acceptance and use of such exchange orders, vouchers, coupons or tickets shall be deemed consent to the further conditions, which follow:

Return to the passenger(s) of all monies for the unused portion of the tour, paid by them, shall release Interplanner from all liability in respect to such a tour. The usual passage contract used by the airlines when issued shall constitute the sole contract between the airlines and the tour member and, in purchasing a passage contract as part of this tour; the participant acknowledges and accepts the foregoing conditions.

The payment for reservations on a tour shall constitute consent to all provisions in the Tour Conditions published herein.

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
